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

"Receive Ye the Holy Spirit" By MARIE E. BROWN

THE word Pentecost means "fifty," and it took place fifty days after the resurrection. "And when the day of Pentecost was fully come, they were all with one accord in one place. And suddenly there came a sound from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting

the house where they were sitting. And there appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire, and it sat upon each of them " (Acts ii. 1-3). Peter explained this to the people around by saying, "This Jesus hath God raised up, whereof we all are witnesses. Therefore being by the right hand of God exalted, and having received of the Father the promise of the Holy Ghost. He hath shed forth this which ye now see and hear " (Acts ii. 32, 33). What was it they could see and hear ? They could see the tongues of fire and hear the wind and the speaking in tongues.

Now what did this manifestation mean, and what are we to learn from it? Pentecost stood for lives consecrated to God, lives set apart for a purpose, and lives endued with power forcefully to witness to an adequate way of life. The Church seems today to be living between the resurrection and Pentecost. If she would only move up to Pentecost nothing in this world could stop her.

Imagine the early Church without Pentecost : those men going out with that wonderful message and they themselves not possessing the power of it. Pentecost made the men and the message one, hence their power. The Cross was the birth-pain of the coming Church, and the resurrection heralded the coming birth : but Pentecost was the time that the Church was born. Here men were commissioned to proclaim a crucified Jesus as Saviour and Master, to establish the new world order of the kingdom of God. But this was to be done in the face of the spirit of enmity, and without Pentecost it would have been impossible. It was not enough for them to see Him and hear Him say, "Peace be unto you. As My Father hath sent Me, even so send I you." No, not even His presence and commission were enough, for up to Pentecost the whole thing was on the outside of them, objective, something spoken and acted before them. It was not in them. Pentecost then was the power that came within and possessed them. Hence they became irresistible disciples of a great passion.

The Church has shied away from Pentecost. She is afraid of it. Teaching concerning the Holy Spirit is the most vague and uncertain thing in the life of the Church. Arthur Hurd says, "It is the undiscovered country of Christianity, the dark continent of Christian life, the land where our spiritual resources lie undeveloped." There was a time when the Christian Church celebrated Whit-Sunday, the anniversary of the coming of the Holy Spirit, more than it did Christmas. Did she find it was easier to celebrate Christ's birth, to commemorate His coming into the world than it was for her to go with His message

to the world? Did it cost less to give gifts at Christmas than to give herself at Pentecost? Christmas is the festival of God with us: Pentecost is the festival of God in us. Is He more with us than in us?

Two things remain in Pentecost as permanent: power for living and power for life-giving. Only prayer can keep this life-giving Spirit alive in us, for prayer is the breath of life in every Christian. Thus it is befitting that it should be made the first step in receiving the Spirit. **Prayer** precipitated Pentecost. Those ten days in prayer brought the disciples face to face with themselves and with their resources.

The second step is **Self-abandonment.** In John's Gospel it is said that the reason the Spirit had not yet been given was that "Jesus was not yet glorified." When He went to the throne the Spirit was given. It is not different today. There is only one thing that keeps us from receiving the Holy Spirit—Jesus is not on the throne of our lives. Another master is there. Only empty hands can grasp Christ. When we are sure that we are withholding nothing, we may then be sure that God is withholding nothing. The gift of the Holy Spirit may then become ours.

The third step is **Faith.** Many fail to go boldly in and possess the land, but they could if they talked faith with God. The promise is to all. Note the Lord said, "Receive ye the Holy Ghost." The word "receive" is active voice, so that it might be translated, "Take ye the Holy Ghost." We are not to wait passively; we are to reach out and take the offered gift. Faith is the venture that dares; it is simply taking what in all sincerity God offers. But faith is not merely an act that takes. It is more; it is an act and an attitude. When one has this faith-attitude there sets in what may be called spiritual initiative and things will happen in such lives.

Pentecost is not the end: it is just the beginning. The spiritual life is both a gift and a growth. As the Holy Spirit was given after ten days of prayer, so the spiritual life must be maintained by prayer. By watchfulness and careful living we are to guard the gift that was committed to us, the blessed Holy Spirit.

If we do not receive the Spirit, then we deliberately cancel the Divine programme for us. If we have not the baptism in the Holy Spirit, it is because we do not want

WHY Every Christian Should Tithe

I^T IS CERTAIN beyond all dispute that tithing is Divinely enjoined upon man and emphatically authorised by the Holy Scriptures. This cannot be said about many other schemes and programmes.

God has originated this as His plan. It is the fairest method conceivable, for by it men are commanded to give **proportionately as God hath prospered them.** "Upon the first day of the week let everyone of you lay by him in store, as **God hath prospered him**" (I. Cor. xvi. 2). It therefore works no hardship upon anyone since each shares in the same proportionate degree (ten per cent) as he has prospered. Without question it eliminates any haphazard, slipshod, hit-and-miss, make-shift practice for Church support. God desires us to be as business-like in carrying on His work as He was in laying its plans. All of His creation is most highly systematised. **Tithing is one of those systems**!

Out of concern for the furthering of His work, and a desire to bless His people God has appointed that the storehouse (the Church treasury) should be full (Mal. iii. 10.) If this Divine injunction were always obeyed, it would never be necessary to put on high-pressure drives, to originate clever schemes, or for the pastor to turn his church into a restaurant. In Divine protest Christ drove out those who had engaged in selling for gain in the temple, instead of praying for growth. "My house shall be called a house of prayer, but ye have made it a den of thieves," was the Saviour's rebuke.

Tithing elevates a man from robbing from God to paying to God that which is rightly His. Man's question is, "Wherein have we robbed Thee?" God answers, "In tithes and offerings" (Mal. ii. 8). Tithing therefore removes a man from a position where he receives curses for faithlessness and disobedience, to a position to receive blessings for faithfulness and obedience. "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in Mine house, and prove Me now herewith, said the Lord of hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing that there shall not be room enough to receive it." While in Malachi iii. 9 God says, "Ye are cursed with a curse: for ye have robbed Me." In the next verse He promised blessing, and in the following He promised to "rebuke the devourer for your sakes," if men will bring their tithes and offerings to Him.

Real satisfaction in the Christian's life lies in being able to establish and maintain a state of proper relative value between commonplace things and holy things—between the secular and the sacred. Tithing will do this !

A church properly financed by the scriptural method of

tithes and offerings not only will have Divine approbation, but the efforts and energies otherwise dissipated in unscriptural financial programmes can be used unreservedly in soul-winning.

The late Bishop Selwyn often quoted John Wesley's motto, "Save all you can and give all you can." He believed that charity did not begin until after a tithe had been paid to God. "Whatever your income," he wrote to his son, "remember that only nine-tenths of it are at your disposal."

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EDITORIAL

CAIRO—WASHINGTON—MOSCOW—ROME

The holiday celebrations in Northern Sudan over the signing of the Anglo-Egyptian agreement on the Sudan still echoed in the Moslem world when the politicallyconscious Egyptian Press recommenced its campaign for the "immediate" evacuation of British troops from the Suez Canal Zone. Before the ink has had time to dry on one document, the Egyptian Foreign Minister is anxious to append his and other signatures to the next, which, in the eyes of many Egyptian people spells freedom from foreign domination. Dr. Fawzi is already busy choosing his delegation to discuss the complex problems which will arise. No doubt the British Government will not be quite so anxious to leave an area which is so vital to the trading nations sharing this important waterway as the Egyptian patriots would like them to be.

Comments on this enthusiasm from the land of the Pharaohs in the *Daily Telegraph* are of interest to students of prophecy. It is pointed out that the main reason for the use of British troops is not only for the defence of the Canal itself, but that of "the defence of the whole Middle East against Communism." In the 1936 Treaty it was stated that "The Suez Canal, whilst being an integral part of Egypt, is a universal means of communication as also an essential means of communication between the different parts of the British Empire." The writer again underlines this thought by adding, "For the Zone lies in an area of great strategic importance, and it could be made, and to Egypt's advantage, the key-point in the defence of the Middle East."

It is quite clear that the Canal can become a bottle-neck in the communications between West and East, and that its very construction makes it extremely vulnerable. If atomic war developed in the area the waters of the Canal could quickly be made radio-active, thus rendering it unusable to shipping. Any enemy closing the Canal would immediately interpose the vast African land mass between the Western world and any Eastern allies.

There are also other and wider issues at stake. The defence of the Middle East depends on air bases which would be pushed back to Cyprus and Jordan if British forces are withdrawn from Egypt. Air Commodore L. G. S. Payne writes, "The strategical value of Canal Zone bases as a vital part of a future Middle East Defence Organisation is obvious. It would be exceedingly difficult to create an effective organisation if these bases were not available or were available only to the forces of one member, Egypt. There seems to be little hope that, if war seemed imminent, political arrangements could be made with the Egyptian Government for the reorganisation of British air defences in the Canal Zone before hostilities began."

A glance at the map will show how the Canal is brought into the orbit of any Russ an ambitions in the Far and Middle East. A rapid thrust at this slender life-line would undoubtedly constitute one of the initial military moves in an aggressive war against the West. That thrust, aimed from the mountain ranges of the Caucasus, would drive over Syria and Jordan. And so Palestine, occupied by the Israel State, lies athwart an army or air force travelling from Russia to Egypt. Palestine, therefore, has a threefold significance for the Soviet leaders at the present time: It would provide the Communist war commanders with the Jewish scapegoat to justify their military adventure-no doubt a case would be presented to the Russian people describing the threat of this growing Jewish community directed by American dollars; it would sever the oil pipeline, so essential in a time of war; and as we have seen, it would cut an indispensable sinew of war and commerce.

We do not draw attention to all this for its political significance, but to show that the Russian menace hangs low over the European scene, and to show why it is possible for the lightning manœuvre of the Northern Confederacy to confirm the prophetic word. The attack will be made where God's Word says it will, in Palestine.

Nor is present American policy designed to favour good relations with the Kremlin. There are signs that Roman Catholic influence may be at work behind the sabrerattling speeches, which cannot have been overlooked in Writing of the Hon. John Foster Dulles, Moscow. American Secretary of State, United Evangelical Action says, "A look at his religious record is not inspiring. The 1952 Peace Medal of the Roman Catholic Third Order of St. Francis was bestowed upon Presbyterian Mr. Dulles last year. One reason the Roman Catholics like him is that his son, Avery, is studying for the Roman Catholic priesthood in a Jesuit seminary." This comment may, of course, mean nothing at all, but on the other hand it may be a straw in the wind. Another pointer comes from the report that "Evangelicals were by-passed again when the Voice of America beamed its Christmas programmes to the Iron Curtain lands. Roman Catholics got the lion's share of the headline broadcasts. Highlighted on all the language programmes was the reading of a poem composed for the Voice by Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York, and dedicated to all United Nations fighting men in Korea."

Knowing of past occasions when the Vatican has interfered in the affairs of other nations, we would not be surprised to find her agents attempting to embroil the powerful American democracy in violent war with her own bitter adversary. It will be interesting to see whether President Eisenhower gives diplomatic recognition to the Vatican by sending an ambassador or personal representative.

The time of Christ's advent surely grows nearer and nearer.



When I called, he came to meet me, waving the arm that was paralysed above his head. I could only say, 'Glory to God. You prayed in Jesus' name instead of Mohammed ?' He said, 'Yes.' So I presented him with an English Bible for Christmas."

Most friends will know by now that Pastor Gorman is back at the office and growing stronger every day. We praise God for this wonderful deliverance. Pastor C. Coe of Canning Town, who met with an accident and had to have a number of stitches in his head, is also making splendid recovery. Pastor Hawes is also improving in health slowly, but steadily.

Plans are in hand among the ministers on the Channel Islands to visit the whole Island with tracts. We shall look forward to news of this venture and of the results.

Well, we have had the block made and have pleasure in publishing this picture of a dear woman of God.




We have just received the following from Pastor G. Stormont:

... PRAY YE... GIVE YE... GO YE...

ENLARGING THE BORDERS

Pastor and Mrs. A. D. Bull (Tanganyika).

I have just returned from a safari to one of our outstations. I could not get through by road so went by rail. This outstation has been on our hearts for a long time as it is the centre for 3,000 labourers from tribes all over Tanganyika, Congo Border, and closed Portuguese East Africa. There is a large local population as well as some nomadic tribespeople, some of whom have decided for Christ. I placed my best Evangelist there three months ago and God is blessing, and souls are being saved. It was after much prayer that we obtained a place for the Evangelist on a large plantation owned by a rich Mohammedan, which in itself is wonderful. It was the manager and not the owner who gave permission. Our big difficulty was that we had no meeting place. How we rejoiced when the Christians said, "Get us a place and we will build our own church." Prayerfully I sought a place and now the church is half built. Yesterday while on a visit to this place I saw Africans of different tribes working side by side, and this, after their normal work day, is a sure sign of their earnestness. Will you pray that we shall experience a real outpouring of the Holy Spirit here, pray too for Petro the Evangelist.

We are the only Protestant mission in this vast area, but there are some Roman Catholic missions. Recently I managed to place a teacher-evangelist in a plantation near their mission, but when the priest heard about it he cajoled and threatened the Catholic manager. The Roman Catholics have been established in this place for the past ten years and have done nothing to help the Africans, but now we have started a work there, the priest has threatened to excommunicate any Catholic who goes to the school. However, I have been able to place a teacher and evangelist on another estate nearby, and daily the children are hearing the Gospel. These teachers are paid by the plantation managers, so there is no financial burden to the Mission.

God has blessed during 1952: our borders have been greatly enlarged, and as we stand on the threshold of the New Year there is the promise of greater things. Will you pray for us and the witness in the clinic, the women's work, the day schools, and our visits to the prisons? Stand with us for an ingathering of souls!

FORMOSA Terrific Typhoon

The main Christmas service was held on Christmas Eve, but we were so crowded that it was impossible to have some of the items planned for the programme. What we did have was a real joy to listen to, especially the testimonies by those who last year saw their first Christmas, and really knew what it was all about. The part that touched everybody's heart most was when a little five-yearold boy, standing on a bench in front of the lighted tree, closed the crowded meeting with the Lord's Prayer. After the meeting we went with a number of the young people, and introduced them to carol singing all round the town. I think they all thoroughly enjoyed it, but you should have seen the look of astonishment on the faces of the people on the streets, as, of course, they had never heard or seen anything like this before.

Some of you have written, that you were very much disturbed when you read about the terrible typhoon that struck this Island. It certainly was terrible, but we missed most of it as it hit the south-west end of the Island. About 600 people lost their lives, and damage to buildings, especially army camps, was terrific. Some who lost their lives were simply taken up in the terrific wind and carried off, never to be seen again. Whole army camps were completely destroyed: built of only bamboo and plaster they did not stand a chance against the 180-mile-an-hour winds.

We heard a thrilling testimony last Sunday night from one of the soldiers who goes to the I Lan church. He was saved less than 18 months ago when we visited a military hospital at Nei-Yuan-Shan. At that time he could not read nor write, but in the short time, since he came to the Lord, he has learned both to read and write, because he wanted to read his Bible. He is now studying two Bible correspondence courses. He gets up at 3 o'clock every morning to pray, and comes a walk of an hour at least four times a week to attend the meetings. Always first there, he sweeps and dusts the whole place. A short while ago he came under an order which meant he was supposed to be in by 9 p.m. every evening, which would have cut out the evening meetings for him, but he still (Continued on page 107)

SUNDAY, March 8th. Mark vii. 1-16.

It is the heart that matters.

Mere outward observances and ceremonials are empty and vain if they do not express heart-piety; but to use them for an excuse to evade one's plain obligations towards one's parents, is downright wickedness (vv. 11-13). What damage has been done to the cause of true religion by folk like these. However, let me not suppose that my contempt for such betokens spirituality on my part. Am I loyal to my parents?

MONDAY, March 9th. Mark vii. 17-37.

Our Lord outside Palestine!

A missionary to pagan Syro-Phœnicia! Did He really rebuff a woman in trouble? Was there not rather behind that "frowning Providence" a "smiling face"? I think so. A local proverb had it, "Children first, then puppies." Such was the word for "dog" here. The pet of the household: not the pariah of the streets. No harshness here, but kindly encouragement, withal veiled, but faith perceives, grasps, and says, "Yes, Lord." And what faith too ! (Matt. xv. 28).

TUESDAY, March 10th. Mark viii. 1-13.

"Faint by the way" (v. 3).

The need of the world has not changed. Still they need The Bread of Life. Nor has His power to meet that need changed. But what of us, His disciples, and our resources? Though meagre and insufficient in themselves, are we willing to bring our all to Him for His blessing upon it? Assuredly as we do we shall see the hungry fed, and abundance to spare. Fancy seven baskets this size! (Acts ix. 25). This miracle wrought among the Gentiles is distinct from that wrought among the Jews in chapter vi. (vv. 19, 20). Both seek Him.

WEDNESDAY, March 11th. Mark viii. 14-26.

A Second Touch (v. 25).

"Just one touch as Hc passes by" was not sufficient in this case. Some are not healed instantly and completely, but partially, and need a second touch from the Master. Alas for the very great number who falter between earth and heaven and do not return for it. This time the man "looked steadfastly and saw all things clearly" (R.V.). The Moon in an eclipse, complained to the Sun, "Why, O my dearest friend, dost thou not shine upon me as usual?" "Do I not?" said the Sun, "I am sure I am shining as I always do. Why do you not enjoy my light as usual?" "Oh, I see," said the Moon, "the Earth has got between us."

THURSDAY, March 12th. Mark viii. 27-38.

A Cross for Christ and a Cross for Christ's (vv. 31, 34). For so it was prophesied of Him (Isa. liii.), and we cannot bless until we bleed. "A marvellous Christianity is this . . . striking the Self out of the man. What, may I not retain one little atom of my very self? And the Gospel says, 'No.' Then what are the terms of acceptance with the higher life? The words are at least four in number. 'Humble himself'; 'Deny himself'; 'Crucify himself'; 'Mortify himself'. Then where am 1? Nowhere ! Killed. Slain. The last shred of selfishness crushed. . . The Saviour says, 'If you want to come into My kingdom, one man must be killed. Who is the man? Yourself !'" (Dr. J. Parker).

FRIDAY, March 13th. Mark ix. 2-13.

The Transfiguration of Jesus (v. 2).

Night, but this is certainly no séauce, for there was no communication from the dead to the living; and the subject of their conversation was the Cross (Luke), not usually the topic at such unholy gatherings! It was a foregleam of Glory, as Peter afterwards realised, though not at the time (2 Pet. i.). "Jesus only with themselves" (v. 8). And that's enough. Hallelujah!

SATURDAY, March 14th. Mark ix. 14-32.

Where were the nine? (vv. 20, 21).

Lacking Faith, lacking Prayer, and lacking Self-Discipline (vv. 28, 29, cp. Matt. xvii. 20, 21). And for these very same reasons we fail to see the signs following today. Let us talk over "our victories, failures, hopes and fears" with Him rather than with each other as we so often do (v. 28). Then the works He did we shall do also, and greater !

Him, or perhaps I should say, do not want Him sufficiently to go through the necessary steps. Only those who bring to Him the price of their all, and believe His Word, shall receive. God has no favourites. That power can be yours, for the Holy Spirit is given to them that ask. "If ye then, being evil, know how to give good gifts unto your children: how much more shall your heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to them that ask Him?" (Luke xi. 13).

Pentecost is not a spiritual luxury ; it is an utter necessity for victorious, Christlike living. The human fails unless the Holy Spirit fills. The Sermon on the Mount is beautiful; but without Pentecost and the power of the Holy Spirit it is impossible of achievement. We cannot go further until we go deeper, nor can we go further until we receive our Pentecost.

For a testimony as to the blessedness of this gift. I would like to say that forty-four years ago I received my Pentecost just as did the hundred-and-twenty in the upper room in Jerusalem. I am sure that I would not have been this long in Glad Tidings Tabernacle were it not for His abiding presence and power. This path was His choosing for me, and it has been with great juy as well as suffering and trial that I have walked it as a co-worker with Him. The Holy Spirit has made the Lord Jesus Christ a living reality, and together our fellowship has been most precious.
