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

editorial . . .

SOLD OUT -- BIBLES !

NE million copies already printed, another million to be printed shortly, bookshops everywhere inundated with orders and selling out as fast as supplies arrive, a well-known firm of booksellers placing the largest single order for any one book in its history-such was the response to the publication of the first part of the New English Bible, namely the New Testament, This is excellent news indeed, and thrills our hearts as we realise that after 2,000 years this Book of books is still in such demand. What other reason can there be than that herein is contained God's message to mankind, a message that is still man's greatest need in this twentieth century ?

Reactions to the new Bible have, of course, been very mixed. It is certain that the new version will come somewhat as a shock to those long accustomed to the Authorised Version. We do not think this will be altogether a bad thing. There is always the danger that our very familiarity with the text of the Authorised can cause us to read it without fully understanding its real meaning. The new version brings some of the familiar passages home to us in their full meaning. and makes us more fully aware of their real significance.

We have remarked before that we do not feel that the Authorised Version is in any way in jeopardy. Our constant companion from childhood, its verses and phrases part of our mental store, it will surely hold its place, especially for those who through the years have grown to love its words of truth and comfort in their old familiar setting.

There are two ways particularly, however, in which we feel the new version will make its impact. First, by the clarity of its modern language, together with the added benefit of recent textual discoveries, making for greater accuracy, it will resolve a great measure of obscurity of certain passages in the Authorised. In this connection we note that over 700 words in the Authorised have now become obsolete, or have changed in meaning. Of course, clarity may have its disadvantages sometimes ! Some may feel that the rather veiled references to sexual matters and the like have been an advantage when reading the Bible to young people, for example.

Then secondly there is its effect on the man in the street, particularly the non-churchgoer. To many such the archaic language of the Authorised has suggested that, together with intoned prayers and creeds, Gothic windows and the redolence of burning incense, it belonged to a bygone age and had no relevance to contemporary life.

Now, in all its stark simplicity, the Bible is brought to us, not in beautiful literary style, but in the tongue of the common man. We like the incident of the scholar visiting Smithfield market to check whether the words to be incorporated were in common use !

Of course, this is not the first—nor we suspect will it be the last of the modern translations, But this is different, for, like the Authorised, it is the work not of one man but of a group of distinguished scholars, and produced under the auspices of a committee representative of most of the non-Roman churches.

Get a copy and read it carefully. It will be a refreshing experience.

OUR GLORIOUS TASK !

Being the substance of sermons on the vital subject of soul-winning given by **REV**, **W. RONALD JONES**, **F.R.G.S.**, of the City Temple, Bristol

I meant when I said that every real Christian should have some part in soul-winning. It might not be on the doorstep; it might not be in the pulpit or on the street corner; it might not be just in the place of prayer; but there is some place, somewhere, where you and I can be in this great task of soul-winning. There are some people who have probably pointed souls to Christ without saying many words, but just by the examples of their lives in the places where they work.

There is no greater task in all the world, for this was the very thing that brought the Son of God from heaven to earth; so none dare minimise the greatness of this task of soul-winning. Jesus came to seek and to save that which was lost. Soul-winning was the task of Christ; soul-winning is still the task of Christ through His Church. It is your duty, young people and older Christians, and your privilege, to equip yourself to win men and women for the Master. I made a statement earlier that every Christian should be a soul-winner, or should have some part in the plan of soul-winning. Why do I believe that every Christian should be concerned about the souls of men? I believe that you and I should be concerned for three main reasons.

(a) We should be concerned about soul-winning because of the fearful and terrifying fate which awaits a soul that is lost. If we believe that the Word of God is true—and we do believe that—the fate that awaits the soul of the Christ-rejector is the most fearful thing we can ever imagine—it is eternal banishment from God, shut off from God for ever and ever and ever. It is confinement to eternal torment and eternal hell for ever aud ever; shut off from God and surrounded by all that is terrible and foul and filthy in the very depth of the shame of an eternal hell. That, on the authority of God's Word, is the fate of a lost soul; and friends, I believe that it was the realisation of the fate of a lost soul that took Jesus to Calvary's Cross. Jesus said: "If it be possible, let this cup pass from Me: nevertheless not as I will, but as Thou wilt." I believe there was a space of time between these two declarations; the shame, the torture and the severe anguish of the Cross were bearing down on His sinless soul, but if He had not drunk of that cup souls would have been lost. I believe that Jesus had a vision again of the fate of lost souls when in the garden of Gethsemane; then He said "nevertheless not as I will, but as Thou wilt." You should be a soul-winner because of the fate of a lost soul.

(b) We should be soul-winners because of the value of a soul. It is so easy in this world of speed and mass-production, this world where men and women have almost become merely numbers, for us to be caught in the current and lose sight of the individual soul. Jesus said: "What shall it profit a man, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul?" Here is the value of a soul—all that the world has to give: put that on one side of the scale and a soul on the other side, and the soul outweighs all the wealth and power of the world. Do you believe that? Of course you do, but how slow we are to respond to that truth.

(c) We should delight to become soul-winners in order that Jesus may see of the travail of His soul and be satisfied. I believe that in every soul that is won for Jesus Christ He sees something more of the travail of His soul and satisfaction is brought to the heart of the Son of God.

THE TITHE AND THANKOFFERING

ON a gloriously sunny spring evening groups of people stood idly chatting outside a church. As I approached the entrance a young mother whom I knew happily greeted me and we talked together for a few moments. Then her small son of about four years pressed himself against her. "Mummy, I picked these for you," and with an extremely pleased expression on his face handed a bunch of dandelions and buttercups mingled with grass ! What will she do and say, I thought, and was highly delighted when she wisely took them from him and thanked him sincerely. And further, she even took them with her into the meeting—a born mother. What her son gave her she knew was from his heart, and to her this was vital and could not be despised.

A mother fondled the handbag which her daughter had given her for her birthday. "But Gwen, where did you get the money to buy it?" she exclaimed. "Mother, I saved sixpence weekly for a year from the pocket-money father gives me." Gwen had nothing in the world but what her father gave her, and the little boy badly wanted to show his mother that he loved her. The basis of tithing must be *love*, and not only from a sense of duty to God or because we understand it from God's Word. We give back to God at least onetenth of all He gives to us because we recognise that all we have is given us by Him.


- "' For giving is living,' the messenger said,

We have been saddened recently by the news from Formosa of the sudden death of a much-beloved missionary, Leonard Bolton. Over thirty-five years ago he left Bournemouth for China. His parents were greatly respected in the early days of Pentecost and helped to maintain some of our earlier missionaries. In 1910 Mr. Bolton senior received the baptism of the Holy Spirit and a great burden for China came upon him. "Lord, I will go even if it means leaving my wife and ten children." he prayed. But instead the Lord chose two of his children. Victoria left first—as Mrs. Fisher she died about twenty years ago. Her father called her his "tithe offering," and when Leonard departed he called him his "thankoffering."

A sister of a London hospital who was converted at Harringay once told me that she found it easy to tithe after she heard Dr. Billy Graham preach on it, but other things to do she proved much harder. Usually one's pocket is the hardest to yield to God !

N a Sunday morning 1 preached upon personal evangelism. Unashamedly I based my suggestions almost entirely upon a book from which I quoted freely to my congregation. And of all things the book, The Harvest In Your Own Land, was for Ireland's Catholics in an endeavour to win to the fold the Protestants of their land ! That made my points more effective I think. The following is some of the advice. "Begin by praying for your prospective convert, then ask him or her to go with you to some Catholic service, Don't discard your booklet, magazine or paper. Leave it on the train, etc., or lying around at your office-any place where you think people will pick it up. Underline some important paragraph, or draw a circle round some special item. The turned-down page, the pencilled circle, the marginal note -each is a challenge to human curiosity. Settle down near someone who looks like an easy talker and read to yourself. Then turn and say 'Excuse me; can you tell me what this pamphlet is driving at ? ' He will prohably be muddled. and before you know you will be taking the lead. Call on a sick non-Catholic, show sympathy and interest and leave a little Catholic reading matter. Use the post to send literature to some interested person. Write letters to the editors of papers." And so it goes on, Protestants Pentecostalists-wake up !

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For many years we have enjoyed on our side of London a monthly East London revival rally, Now there is also a West London revival rally, held on the same day. Together these rallies attract several hundreds amid great blessing and enthusiasm. Though inaugurated by and chiefly composed of Elim churches, several Assemblies of God combine with us. There is a constant enthusiasm that belies the misconception some have of the temperature and the temperament of the metropolis. The rallies certainly contribute to the Pentecostal blessing of the churches concerned.

Putting a ban on the placing of plastic flowers on graves, the rector in question declared: "Even if there were no flowers I should still insist on the artificial ones being removed. I hate them." People's opinions and interest about the care of graves differ, or in the manner wherehy we respect the memory of loved ones. In one pastorate of mine, each Sunday morning for a very considerable time I would meet one of my members, a widow, on her way to the cemetery while my family and I were on our way to remember the Lord's death. In this matter there is no disputing which was the right road to be travelling just then.

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Of the plastic flowers, the vicar cited above remarked: "I admit these copies are very skilfulyou have to examine them closely to find out they are frauds." I thought of a friend I brought to my home in Scotland many years ago. He took a beautiful apple from a dish and said: "It looks so perfect you would think it was artificial." That statement was wiser than maybe at first reading it appears to be. The real thing, the natural, is rarely without a flaw. Stained-glass window saints are usually coloured more than ever nature itself had done to them.

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At least thirty local churches and assemblies have already agreed to conduct a nine-day Billy Graham relay mission when the evangelist visits Manchester. Unanimously it was agreed and requested that this should he held in our church because of its central position, its attractiveness and its facilities. This may be a compliment to us, but more so it is a testimony to the unselfish spirit of the ministers and leaders of the several denominations concerned. Committee meetings and united prayer meetings are centred in the Elim Church. God is sure to bless such a united cffort. Y:

PRAYER—THE ROYAL COMMAND PERFORMANCE (8) PERSISTENCE IN PRAYER

"Praying with all prayer and supplication in the Spirit . . . with all perseverance for all saints" (Ephesians 6:18).

"WITH all perseverance !" Perhaps the best example of perseverance in prayer is the child who wants something from his mother. If a baby, he makes himself heard by a tiny whimper which, if unregarded, grows to a fretful crying and usually ends in a volume of sound that sends his now remorseful mother scurrying to his side to stop the noise, lest the neighbours think she is maltreating her offspring, who is nothing if not persistent.

His elder brother, of an age to wield a cricket bat and longing to become the possessor of one, employs rather different tactics. "Mummy, will you buy me a cricket bat?" asks he in a beguiling manner calculated to melt the stoniest heart. Mother, whose mind is occupied with the preparation of food, or maybe ways and means, replies absently, "Perhaps." Days later, Tommy continues the theme, this time in a slightly accusing tone. She promised, didn't she? Well, *almost*. Thus he argues. Mother, who has no clear idea of having made any such promise, says pacifically, "We'll see."

Tommy, returning from school a week later, confronts his mother and says in desperation: "I must have a bat, mummy. All the boys in my class have one."

Though having strong doubts about there being such a plenitude of bats among the local small fry, mother, realising that to her elder son this is a matter of great moment, says: "I'll speak to daddy abont it, and I'll give you the verdict at breakfast tomorrow provided you do not say another word on the subject."

Tommy doesn't. Not really. He just looks, and looks, and looks across the breakfast table at his maddeningly unperturbed parents.

Tommy is persistent, you see.

"Ye that make mention of the Lord, keep not silence, and give Him no rest . . . till He make Jerusalem a praise in the earth" (Isaiah 62:6,7). In short, be like Tommy.

You see, that boy had confidence in his parents' good will towards him: he knew that they would not refuse him anything that would contribute to his well-being in any way if it was within their power to secure it for him. "Keep not silence, give Him no rest, till . . ." But why? Why have the children of God to persist in presenting their petitions to Him? Is God a reluctant giver? Think it not, even for a moment. He loves to give, and His liberality puts our best efforts to shame (2 Corinthians 9:15; 1 Timothy 6:17; James 1:5).

For a variety of reasons God sometimes delays in answering prayer, thus necessitating our reiterating our request: for the testing of our faith in Him; or to develop in us that lovely grace in which many of us are deficient—patience; or because it would not be in our best interests were He to answer us immediately. Each of us needs the discipline of the practice of prayer—and, in particular, persistent prayer.

It is not good for a child's character for his father or mother or guardian always to grant him his request immediately it is uttered. Such a child would grow up into a repulsive creature with an inflated idea of his own importance, in whose eyes his seniors would merely be amiable nonentities whom he could exploit at will or set aside as utterly negligible. A child must be trained to respect those who have the care of him; to respect their maturer judgment as well as to trust in their understanding and integrity. The same applies to the child of God.

Consider the case of Elijah. It is very interesting to note that although the Lord had declared He would end the prolonged drought in Israel and would send rain His servant the prophet Elijah nevertheless had to pray—and to wait—for that rain. Seven times Elijah sent his servant to scan the heavens for signs of the imminent deluge, but until the seventh occasion the heavens remained shut. And then—" there was a great rain " (1 Kings 18:1, 42-45). Yet, straogely enough, on Carmel but a short while before the Lord had *instantly* granted Elijah's prayer for fire from heaven to consume the sacrifice on the Lord's altar which he had restored.

We come to the New Testament, to that appealing story of the Syrophenician woman who desired the Lord Jesus to deliver her daughter who was grievously bound by demon-possession (Matthew 15:21-28). Again and again she cried to the Lord and His disciples. Then, (oh blessed declaration !): "I am not sent *but* unto the *lost sheep of the house of Israel,*" said Jesus. Then she came, saying "Lord, help *me.*" She recognised that, though she could not claim affiliation with the race of which He was the most illustrious member (an alien was she from the commonwealth of Israel, the chosen people of God), His grace enabled her to approach Him. Said He: "It is not meet to take the children's bread, and to cast it to dogs." In other words, Jehovah was Israel's saving health, as vital to her continued existence as bread is to the physical body. And *she* belonged to a people who, as worshippers of false gods, had no part or lot in Him; they were as the pariah dogs that scavenge the streets after nightfall.

Her humility was such that she instantly acknowledged her lowly estate. "Truth, Lord: yet the dogs eat of the crumbs which fall from their masters' table." Ah, what lowliness of mind ! She was one of the Gentile "dogs." What reverence ! He was Master. What persistence ! "Yet the dogs eat the crumbs." And what adaptability ! The crumbs, the little bits, Small wonder she secured her heart's desire !

CHRISTIANITY MEANS GOOD PROGRESS AT PAISLEY'S NEW "CHURCH WITH A NURSERY "

Prayer begins each day for workers at Elim building site

WHEN passers-by pause—as they have been doing trequently in these past few weeks—to watch the busy workmen and admire the speed with which a new church is growing in the west end of Paisley, they are seeing Christianity itself vigorously in action; for Christian achievement here is remarkable in more ways than one.

The Elim church at 22 Wellmeadow will embody several features that rank it as unique among the town's places of worship. Paisley's response to an intense evangelical effort has made its building possible within two years of the establishment of the local congregation. Dedication to the task in hand is shown among the builders themselves many of the men join in prayer before each day's work begins.

It is no more than seventeen months since Rev. Alexander Tee arrived after eight years' service in Motherwell to launch his Paisley ministry. The Elim Church was soon building up a local following eager to help in establishing a permanent place of worship. Already, despite the fact that the growing congregation still numbers only about 200, altogether £1,700 has been raised towards the cost of some £9,000 for the new building.

The concrete foundation for the church was laid in one day on February 11. Two days later the work of building began and in little more than two weeks the small squad of bricklayers and labourers—at no time more than seven men—had completed three of the 22-foot-high outer walls and much of the interior brickwork of the 55-foot-broad building.

Some 90,000 bricks are expected to have been laid by this weekend, and the church should be ready for occupancy in the late summer.

"We are having to use every available inch of the site because of its small size," Mr. Tee told the *Express*, "but seating will be provided for almost 400 people, with a gallery that can be shut off by a sliding partition to provide a hall with 100 seats."

The church, however, is being built with a girderreinforced flat roof on which it is planned ultimately to erect a larger hall when further funds become available.

An innovation in the main structure will be a nursery with a 6ft, by 4ft, window giving pn to the interior of the church and making it possible for mothers to bring their children and remain with them while still seeing the service.

The active Christians who have a part in the planning

and construction of the church are not confined to the ranks of workmen. Mr. John Angus, of Airdric, the architect, is an ardent evangelist who has designed several other churches, including the one where he worships in his home town. Mr. James Eiliot, of the Linwood firm responsible for the building in all its stages, is president of the Evangelistic Hall in Wilson Street. Renfrew, and several of his workers at present engaged on the church site take part in the special prayer meetings that he conducts on six mornings each week at the mission. ("We thought it would be a good way in which to start each day. The architect himself has been attending since the work on the church began, and bricklayers, labourers and a joiner also take part.")

Of the Christian appreach to work Mr. Elliot says: "It means that we have better co-ordination and a more harmonious relationship. Anyone asked to do a menial task does it without question. We have our occasional moans, of course, but among building contractors we can congratulate ourselves upon having one of the best teams."

Co-operation and enthusiasm in several respects certainly have their proof in the new church building at 22 Wellmeadow. Its red-brick walls, as yet unroofed, will already be housing its first congregation for a brief service on Sunday when, at 6 p.m., three weeks after the beginning of the work, the foundation-stone will be unveiled. Afterwards a notable day in the hustling history of the Elim Church in Paisley will be completed with a special haptismal service at the corporation swimming bath.



A tribute to the late Rev. L. G. Bolton, who died in hospital in Formosa on February 18th, 1961.

After serving in France in the first world war in 1914-18, Mr. Bolton married a Bournemouth lady, and both had a call from God in the early twenties to go to China as missionaries. Mr. Bolton gave up a career in the motor industry to carry this out.

They sailed for China in the year 1924. They had many set-backs in the first place. Mr. Alfred Lewer, also a missionary, was drowned in the Mekong river going down to meet them at Rangoon, and they had to make their own way up-country to their mission station at Yunnan without knowing any language or dialect. They spent many years there. Mrs. Bolton died out there after a short while. Mr. Bolton conquered the language, and built his own church and house, and had many converts to the Christian faith, and many were baptised in the river.

After a time Mr. Bolton remarried to an American missionary, Miss A. Buckwater, and they had a son and two daughters.

They carried on the work until the Communist occupation, when they had to leave China, much to their regret.

Mr. and Mrs. Bolton have had churches in several parts of the world, including the border of Tibet, Assam, Hawaii, Jamaica and Formosa. His missionary son will carry on the work in Formosa where Mrs. Bolton is continuing in this work for the present.

For quite a time he battled with his nerves. After much prayer and fellowship the dear brother is back in the fight, but I did wonder what was the cause, and who was to blame.

I was again visiting a pastor broken down in health, and talking to a person who knows the situation I said: "What is the reason?" "Oh," said the brother. "he has had enough to break any man, and if I had only known I would have done something about it." This assembly was not at all a difficult one. but the strain of leadership often falls heavily even among the best of people. The strain was too much.

REDERICK Barbarossa, for that was his full name, joined the Crusaders in 1189. He was no ordinary fellow, for he was an emperor-Emperor Frederick Barbarossa I. Indeed, history informs us that he was perhaps the greatest of all medieval emperors. He was certainly a fine chap; everybody seemed to like him and, probably due to his attractive personality, he was universally respected. A man of his calibre would today be a valuable asset to any Crusader branch except for one thing-his age would be against him. When he became a Crusader he was sixty-seven years of age, which gives me an opportunity to explain.

Barbarossa was one of the thousands of warriors of the eleventh-thirteenth centuries who were determined for the sake of Christ as they thought to win back the holy land of Palestine from the aliens who had conquered it. Eight great crusades were launched to achieve this end, yet none was completely successful. However, the men who risked and gave their lives for the cause are still remembered as those who have set an enduring example to all who would do battle for the cause of Christ. We have assumed their title and are engaged in a crusade for Christ. Are we true crusaders? These men were prepared to lay down their lives for the sake of an earthly kingdom; what price are we willing to pay in our crusade for the far higher cause of the eternal heavenly kingdom of Jesus Christ? We all must share this spirit of utter sacrifice for our crusade to succeed.

Barbarossa was a man of experience and authority possessing a fiery zeal for his mission. In him were vested all the qualities needed to lead the third crusade to glorious victory. Yet in spite of his fine qualities he failed, and this is how it happened.

Great preparations had been made for this attempt: it was an enterprise with Philip of France and the Lion Heart of England giving their assistance. Almost at the outset the great Barbarossa went swimming in the River Kalycadnus, got into difficulties and drowned. His armies, dispirited and de-

moralised because of the loss of their leader, soon abandoned the whole venture. How very much this almost farcical failure savours of our efforts as crusaders for Christ. Full of zeal and enthusiasm at the close of a youth rally, gloriously filled with the Spirit of God at our churches, yet almost the very moment we go out to battle against the enemy our zeal flags, our enthusiasm wanes, the commission of Christ that a few moments before had burned in our hearts is drowned in some trivial passing fancy or pleasure, which makes our crusade for Christ appear almost a comedy to the world. Barbarossa took up the red cross of the Crusaders, but failed to go with his crusade. Let us remember the words of our Master, "Take up thy cross and follow Me."

Scripture Union Portions. Notes by E. F. Cole

Monday, April 10th. Numbers 11 : 1-20.

"And the mixt multitude that was among them fell a lusting " (v, 4); "and the anger of the Lord was kindled greatly " (v, 10).

In these days when a "mixed multitude" is so often the order of things, when liberal minds with liberal manners despise the old order, it is refreshing to meet with those who seek the old paths, knowing that they lead to ultimate blessing and victory. The communion of the Holy Ghost can only be enjoyed as a strict observance is kept of the laws and principles of the kingdom of heaven. The people complained "There is nothing at all beside this manna." If something has taken the place of the living Word, seek and see whether your separation is as decisive as the Bible demands it should be.

Tuesday, April 11th. Numbers 11 : 21-35.

"While the flesh was yet between their teeth" (v. 33). It is not surprising that those who fail to nourish their souls with the manna of the living Word are tempted to satisfy themselves with pleasures and pastimes that once formed part of their old life, which after all was merely an existence. Like those of old of whom the paalmist apeaks, "And He gave them their request; but sent leanness into their soul," they indulge and then suffer the pangs of spiritual malnutrition. The people indulged and died. To be carnally minded is death; to be spiritually minded is life and peace. Re sure in all your longings and desires to keep your spiritual salvation in view.

Wednesday. April 12th. Numbers 12 : 1-16.

"Were you not afraid to speak against My servant Moses?" (v, 8).

It has ever been the lot of God's choicest servants to meet with the criticism and scorn of those who lend themselves to Satan for what may be known as some of his most destructive work. God taught Miriam and Aaron a lesson, and it ought to be borne in mind that God has accepted the responsibility of producing, preparing and preserving His anointed. If you interfere with them you may find yourself alone with God for a lesson in Christian grace and manners. It has been abundantly proved that when a church esteems its minister it enjoys peace and prosperity.

Thursday, April 13th. Numbers 13 : 16-33.

"And Caleb stilled the people" (v. 30).

The fever and ferment of excited people make it impossible to give a true view and right assessment of any situation. There is a lesson here for all to learn. If you would know God, His will, His way. His Word, you must cultivate the habit of being quiet. "Be still, and know that I am God." Exaggerated reports of difficulties ahead and of seemingly insurmountable barriers can quite well blot out the vision of God's plan and purpose for our lives. It is a good thing when viewing all the advantages and disadvantages of the situation before us to "be of good courage" (v. 20).

Friday, April 14th. Numbers 14 : 1-10.

" If the Lord delight in us, then He will bring us into this land " (v, 8).

Signs and wonders most certainly confirm the Word of the Lord and the faith of His saints, but a mere knowledge of the spectacular will not suffice in the day of test and challenge. "How long will it be ere they believe Me, for all the signs which 1 have shewed among them?" (v, H). Caleb and Joshua pinned their faith to God's promise and disregarded the difficulties in the land. It is this living faith in the Word of the Lord that will enable you to overcome every barrier that lies between you and the fulfilment of the promise of God. Quiet thinking and a clear vision result in quick action (ch. 13 : 30).

Saturday, April 15th, Numbers 14 : 11-25.

"But as traly as I live, all the earth shall be filled with the glory of the Lord " (v, 21).

Sin and disobedience to the voice of God had robbed God of glory. It was His desire that the heathen should witness His power and see His glory. What a wonderful opportunity the people had of being strong and doing exploits in the name of the God of Israel. It is the same today. God delights to show forth His power and might through a people allied to Him by living faith. "If thou wouldest believe, thou shouldest see the glory of God." Too many acts of disobedience disrupt the work of the Lord, and too much time is spent in repentance and sorrow which might have been spent in beholding the glory of the Lord.

Sunday, April 16th. Numbers 14: 26-45.

"Ye shall know My breach of promise" (v. 34).

Here was a people destined to fulfil God's great plan and purpose for the race. What a privilege, what a noble task, with every provision made for ultimate and final success. But how foolish and failing is the human heart when it dispenses with God's wisdom and power. How sad the words "ye shall know the altering of My purpose." The people lusted and consequently lost all the high honour that awaited them. Christian friend, there is a glorious and noble enterprise for yon in the way of the Lord. Beware lest you know only a breach instead of the blessing.


