- Armstrong, William Park, editor. *Calvin and the Reformation*. Grand Rapids: Baker, 1980. A reprint of a famous 1909 work which includes essays by Emile Doumergue, August Lang, Herman Bavinck, and Benjamin Warfield.
- *Battles, Ford Lewis. Robert Benedetto, editor. *Interpreting John Calvin*. Grand Rapids: Baker, 1996. A very important anthology of some of the most important work done on John Calvin by one of the most important Calvin scholars of the twentieth century.
- *Battles, Ford Lewis. *Analysis of the Institutes of the Christian Religion*. Grand Rapids: Baker, 1980. Perhaps the most useful guide to the classic work of Calvin available. Highly recommended.
- Bavinck, Herman. Geerhardus Vos, translator. *Calvin and Common Grace*. n.p. A monograph that is rare and quite helpful.

- *Bouwsmma, William J. *John Calvin: A Sixteenth-Century Portrait*. New York: Oxford, 1988. One of the most important modern biographies. Highly recommended.
- Bowen, David Anderson. "John Calvin's Ecclesiological Adiaphorism: Distinguishing the 'Indifferent,' the 'Essential,' and the 'Important' in his Thought and Prac-

- Bratt, John H., editor. *The Rise and Development of Calvinism*. Grand Rapids: Eerdmans, 1959. Five essays with two of the most important by John Bratt, the editor.
- Bratt, John H. *The Life and Teachings of John Calvin: A Study Manual*. Grand Rapids: Baker Book House, 1958. A small guide designed for group study of Calvin and his thought.
- Bratt, John H., editor. *The Heritage of John Calvin*. Grand Rapids: Eerdmans, 1973. A series of lectures originally given at Calvin College. Some very important material by good writers.
- Butin, Philip Walker. *Revelation, Redemption & Response: Calvin's Trinitarian Understanding of the Doctrine of Human Relationship*. New York: Oxford, 1995. An important historical theology that is part of the modern reassessment of Calvin.
- Calvin, John. *Concerning Scandals*. John W. Fraser, translator. Grand Rapids, Michigan: Eerdmans, 1978. The first modern edition of a tract written in 1550 to address various obstacles which hinder people in the course of accepting the gospel.
- Calvin, John. *Tracts and Treatises*, 3 Volumes. Henry Beveridge, translator. Historical Notes and Introduction by T. F. Torrance. Grand Rapids: Eerdmans, 1958. Includes important work by Calvin with a short life by Theodore Beza, his contemporary.
- Calvin, John. *The Bondage and Liberation of the Will: A Defence of the Orthodox Doctrine of Human Choice Against Pighius*. Grand Rapids: Baker, 1996. A. N. S. Lane, editor. G. I. Davies, translator. Calvin's response to the Roman Catholic theologian Albert Pighius. One

- of the most significant of Calvin's works which was not translated until recently.
- Calvin, John. *Institutes of the Christian Religion*, 2 volumes. John T. McNeill, editor. Ford Lewis Battles, translator. Philadelphia: The Westminster Press, 1960.
- Calvin, John. *Institutes of the Christian Religion, 1536 Edition*. Ford Lewis Battles, translator. The first edition of the famous work, written when Calvin was only twenty-seven years of age.
- Calvin, John. *Letters of John Calvin*. Edinburgh: The Banner of Truth Trust, 1980. Insightful, warm, and devotional.
- Calvin, John. *Calvin's Ecclesiastical Advice*. Mary Benty and Benjamin W. Farley, translators. Louisville: Westminster/John Knox, 1991. A collection of forty-six letters and writings of Calvin which includes his advice to both individuals and groups on theology, prayer, reformation, ethics, worship, politics, etc.
- Calvin, John. *The Necessity of Reforming the Church*. Dallas: Protestant Heritage Press, 1995. This tract was Calvin's treatment of the principal disputes of the Reformation. Defends the Reformers against the charge of schism.
- Calvin, John. *The Mystery of Godliness and Other Sermons*. Morgan, Pennsylvania: Soli Deo Gloria, 1999. A reprint which includes fourteen sterling sermons by Calvin. A good place to go to begin any reading of his sermonic material.
- "Calvin Bibliography 1960-1970," *Calvin Theological Journal* 5 (November 1971), 156-195, and annual supplements thereafter. An exhaustive and contemporary bibliography that provides full coverage for both Calvin and related subjects. Important for all serious students of modern Calvin literature.
- Cottret, Bernard. M., Wallace McDonald, translator. *Calvin:*

- A Biography*. Grand Rapids: Eerdmans, 2000. A highly regarded new biography written first in French. Praised for painting a balanced portrait of the man and his thought.
- Dakin, A. *Calvinism*. London: Duckworth, 1940. One of the more highly regarded popular overviews of Calvin's thought that is dated and less valuable than more recent works.
- De Greef, W., Lyle D. Bierma, translator. *The Writings of John Calvin: An Introductory Guide*. Grand Rapids: 1993. A survey of both Calvin's exegetical and controversial works that brings them within the reach of the non-technical reader.
- Dillenberger, John., editor. *John Calvin: Selections from His Writings*. New York: Anchor Books Edition, 1971. The best collection of this type.
- Douglass, Jane Dempsey. *Women, Freedom and Calvin*. Philadelphia: Westminster, 1985. A provocative book which takes Calvin's view of freedom and applies it to modern discussions about the role and ministry of women.
- Dowey, Edward A., Jr. "Continental Reformation: Works of General Interest, Studies in Calvin and Calvinism Since 1948," in *Church History* 24: 360-367; 29: 127-204.
- *Dowey, Edward A., Jr. *The Knowledge of God in Calvin's Theology*. Grand Rapids: Eerdmans, 1954. Heiko Oberman, the great Reformation historian, says "This lucid and substantial book will be hailed throughout the world of scholars and students of sixteenth-century history."
- Duffield, G. E., editor. *John Calvin: A Collection of Distinguished Essays*. Grand Rapids: Eerdmans, 1966. Includes material by J. I. Packer, T. H. L. Parker, Ford Lewis Battles and Basil Hall, among others.

- Forstman, H. Jackson. *Word and Spirit: Calvin's Doctrine of Biblical Authority*. Stanford, California: Stanford University Press, 1962. The first book of its kind, dealing with an important Calvin theme.
- *Gamble, Richard C., editor. *Articles on Calvin and Calvinism*. New York: Garland Publishing Company, 1992, 14 volumes. This expensive set gathers together the finest Calvin articles from scores of sources covering a period of several hundred years. It is worth its weight in gold to the student of Calvin's life and thought.
- *George, Timothy, editor. *John Calvin and the Church. A Prism of Reform*. Louisville: Westminster/John Knox Press, 1990. A wonderful interdisciplinary collection of essays by fourteen modern writers.
- Gerrish, B. A. *Grace and Gratitude: The Eucharistic Theology of John Calvin*. Minneapolis: Augsburg Press/Fortress Press, 1993. The first major study of Calvin's doctrine of the Lord's Supper in twenty-five years.
- Hall, Charles A. M. *With the Spirit's Sword: The Drama of Spiritual Warfare in the Theology of John Calvin*. Zürich: EVZ-Verlag, 1968. An unusual work that will bear fruit for serious readers.
- Hancock, Ralph C. *Calvin and the Foundations of Modern Politics*. Ithaca/London: Cornell University Press, 1989.
- Helm, Paul. *Calvin and the Calvinists*. Edinburgh: The Banner of Truth Trust, 1982. A refutation of the work of R. T. Kendall, who seeks to drive a rather large wedge between Calvin and the Calvinists who followed him in the century after his death.

- Holwerda, David E., editor. *Exploring the Heritage of John Calvin: Essays in Honor of John Bratt*. Grand Rapids: Baker, 1976. An unusual collection that includes material on aspects of Calvin study not found in similar works.
- Hoogstra, Jacob T., editor. *John Calvin: Contemporary Prophet*. Grand Rapids: Baker, 1959. Contributors to this valuable volume include John Gerstner, Pierre Marcel, Phillip E. Hughes, G. C. Berkouwer, Gregg Singer, and W. Stanford Reid, among others.
- Höpfl, Harro, editor. *Luther and Calvin on Secular Authority*. New York: Cambridge University Press, 1991. A useful small work on the theme.
- *Hunter, A. Basil. *The Teaching of Calvin*. London: James Clarke, 1950. One of the most highly esteemed overviews of Calvin's thought, still very useful.
- Jansen, J. F. *Calvin's Doctrine of the Work of Christ*. London: James Clarke, 1956. A short overview of Calvin's approach to Christ's work as prophet, priest, and king.

print but is valuable because it sheds clear light upon the man himself.

Parker, T. H. L. *Calvin's Preaching*. Louisville: Westminster/John Knox, 1992. An important study of John Calvin's preaching activity, style, purpose, and method.

Parker, T. H. L. *The Oracles of God*. London: Lutterworth, 1947. Parker's earlier work on Calvin as a preacher.

*Parker, T. H. L. *The Doctrine of the Knowledge of God*. Edinburgh: Oliver & Boyd, 1952. A small, very important, out-of-print work that is crucial to understanding Calvin.

Parker, T. H. L. *Calvin: An Introduction to His Thought*. Louisville: Westminster/John Knox, 1995. One of the finest short overviews in the last decade by a dean of Calvin study.

Partee, Charles. *Calvin and Classical Philosophy*. Leiden, Holland: E. J. Brill, 1977. An important technical work for scholars.

Peterson, Robert A. *Calvin's Doctrine of the Atonement*. Phillipsburg, New Jersey: Presbyterian and Reformed Publishing Co., 1983. A short but useful introduction to the theme.

Pitkin, Barbara. *What Pure Eyes Could See: Calvin's Doctrine of Faith in Its Exegetical Context*. New York: Oxford, 1999. An extremely important academic study in historical theology.

Puckett, David L. *John Calvin's Exegesis of the Old Testament*. Louisville: Westminster/John Knox, 1995. A good contemporary addition to the field.

Quistorp, Heinrich., Harold Knight, translator. *Calvin's Doctrine of Last Things*. Richmond, Virginia: John Knox press, 1955. An overview of Calvin's thought on eschatology.

Rainbow, Jonathan H. "Double Grace: John Calvin's View of the Relationship of Justification and Sanctification," *Ex Auditu*, 5 (1989), 99-105.

Rainbow, Jonathan H. *The Will of God and the Cross. An Historical and Theological Study of John Calvin's Doctrine of Limited Redemption*. Allison Park, Pennsylvania: Pickwick Publications, 1990. An important work in a controversial area.

Reist, Benjamin A. *A Reading of Calvin's Institutes*. Louisville: Westminster/John Knox, 1991. A short, fresh primer which seeks to provide the gist of *The Institutes of the Christian Religion*.

*Schreiner, Susan E. *The Theatre of His Glory: Nature & the Natural Order in the Thought of John Calvin*. Grand Rapids: Baker, 1991. Considers the purpose of the created order, the nature of angels and the human soul, the divine order in society and the redemption of all creation. An insightful historical theology of a major part of Calvin's work.

Shepherd, Victor A. *The Nature and Function of Faith in the Theology of John Calvin*. Macon, Georgia: Mercer University Press, 1983. A dissertation that is very important for scholars who wish to study Calvin's view of faith.

*Steinmetz, David. *Calvin in Context*. New York: Oxford, 1995. An accessible, general introduction to Calvin's thought which engages a wide range of primary source material.

Stevenson, William R. Jr. *Sovereign Grace: The Place and Significance of Christian Freedom in John Calvin's Political Thought*. New York: Oxford, 1999. A study of one chapter, "On Christian Freedom," in *The Institutes of the Christian Religion*.

Tamburello, Dennis E. *Union with Christ: John Calvin and*

the Mysticism of St. Bernard. Louisville: Westminster/John Knox, 1994. The notion of union with Christ and the mystical emphasis of the medieval period are explored in this contemporary work.

Tavard, George H. *The Starting Point of Calvin's Theology*. Grand Rapids: Eerdmans, 2000. Shows how the early work of Calvin should be the starting point for understanding his entry into the Reformed way that developed in time.

Torrance, Thomas F. "Calvin's Doctrine of the Trinity," *Calvin Theological Journal*, 25 (1990), 165-193.

Torrance, Thomas F. *The Hermeneutics of John Calvin*. Edinburgh: Scottish Academic Press, 1988. An appreciative work that opens up Calvin's view of the subject by an important modern theologian.

Van Buren, Paul. *Christ in Our Place: The Substitutionary Character of Calvin's Doctrine of Reconciliation*. Grand Rapids: Eerdmans, 1957. Very helpful survey and theological study.

Van Ruler, Arnold A., John Bolt, translator. *Calvinist Trinitarianism and Theocentric Politics*. Lewiston, New York: The Edwin Mellen Press, 1989. A look at how a twentieth-century theologian developed Calvinistic thought in an important area.

*Wallace, Ronald S. *Calvin's Doctrine of the Christian Life*. Eugene, Oregon: Wipf & Stock Publishers, 1997. A fresh, well-written and most important work.

*Wallace, Ronald S. *Calvin, Geneva and the Reformation. A Study of Calvin as Social Reformer, Churchman, Pastor and Theologian*. Grand Rapids: Baker, 1988.

*Wallace, Ronald S. *Calvin's Doctrine of Word and Sacrament*. Eugene, Oregon: Wipf & Stock, 1997. This work has borne wonderful blessing to me personally. I go back to

Warfield Benjamin B. *Calvin and Calvinism*. New York: Oxford, 1931. A major conservative older work that still yields much to the interested reader.
